Campus Club Project and Service Ideas

Campus clubs are unique in nature because students are busy with school, work and extracurricular activities. Because of this, the projects you do and the way you do them might differ from a Traditional Lions club.

Spring Break Projects

Time off from classes around spring break gives campus clubs the opportunity to get involved in a project that lasts longer than a few hours. Start planning now for your clubs spring break project.

- Consider volunteering with [Habitat for Humanity](#), a nonprofit organization that builds simple, decent and affordable homes to families around the world.
- Another opportunity for volunteer service is through an organization called [HandsOn New Orleans](#). The HandsOn Network provides ongoing opportunities for volunteers to make a difference in the recovery of the Gulf Coast region. HandsOn provides projects and affordable housing for volunteers. They also offer a [Volunteer Leader Program](#), designed to teach leaders like you how to plan projects, access community resources and recruit volunteers.

Going Green

- Plant a tree: Consider donating a tree to your campus quad and plant the tree together as a club.
- Recycle: Organize a campus-wide recycling program. Set up a booth on campus to collect old computers, printers, ink cartridges and cell phones.
