#### DELIVERING A LIFELINE



“Surgical patients must never worry whether enough blood will be present to be safe.” So said one Lion who helped take blood banking facilities to non-profit Al-Jabal Hospital, in Kernayel, Mount Lebanon, Lebanon.

To more efficiently serve the 200,000 people from Kernayel and 45 nearby towns and villages, the hospital expanded its surgical capacity. Though a positive move toward better healthcare service, expansion created an unintended, potentially life-threatening negative consequence. “The hospital couldn’t store enough blood for the increased number of surgeries,” said the Lion. “We needed to create a blood bank. We needed help from our foundation.”

“With LCIF’s help, the hospital is more self-sufficient. We are safer.”

With a US\$50,000 Matching grant from Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) added to funds collected locally, Lions renovated unused rooms at the hospital, and purchased equipment and furniture, to establish the blood bank. “With LCIF’s help, the hospital we have supported for years is now more self-sufficient. It no longer must rely on blood from hospitals far away and hard to reach when snow and ice cover the roads. We are safer.”

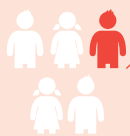
