

#### Working together to provide free books to children

In many low-income neighborhoods in the U.S. there is only one book for every 300 children! A child who does not own books is at risk of being behind in school and will likely miss valuable opportunities to develop fundamental skills needed to succeed in life.

As Lions from around the world take strides to improve literacy as part of the Reading Action Program, clubs and districts in the U.S. have an important opportunity to promote the joy of reading and lifelong learning. By partnering with Reading Is Fundamental (RIF), Lions can place books in the hands of the nation's most vulnerable children.

The largest children's literacy nonprofit in the U.S., RIF focuses on providing free books and literacy resources to low-income families. By giving children the opportunity to own books, RIF inspires children to become lifelong readers and achieve their full potential. Since RIF's inception in 1966, the organization has provided 400 million free books to more than 35 million children. There are still many more children ... and more communities... to reach.

As a district, as a club, or even as individuals, Lions can make a big difference, one child and one book at a time. Here are a few ways to get involved:

#### Organize a Virtual Book Drive

RIF focuses on providing children with their very own new, high-quality books. Through strong partnerships with publishers, they can get the same books you would buy at a bookstore for a fraction of the price. Use RIF's online tools to host a virtual book drive or collect funds to buy new books for kids in need.

#### Give Books to RIF Kids

If you are interested in teaming up with a RIF program nearby, you can get exclusive access to discounts for high-quality children's books. You could also donate a collection of books in honor of a Lions club member.

#### Host a Family Reading Day

Nothing sparks the love of reading like an exciting day with free books for kids to choose and keep. You can sponsor your own Family Reading Day with a RIF program in your region and have all the tools you need to make it a success.

#### Join the Movement

RIF has launched Book People Unite, a national campaign to shine a spotlight on children's literacy. You can unite friends and family in your community to stand with RIF. ## **USO LITERACY INITIATIVE**



#### Working Together to Support U.S. Military Children Through Reading

Lions in the U.S. have an amazing opportunity to promote reading and impact the literacy of military children. As part of the Reading Action Program Lions can support the USO and United Through Reading's Military Program by providing assistance to the children of military families.

Separation from a parent is one of life's most stressful events for children, affecting their sense of security, their relationships, and their ability to learn. As U.S. troops are asked to leave again on their third, fourth and even fifth deployments, the USO recognizes the urgent need to help the family members that are left behind. For the children of wounded, ill and injured troops the stressors of getting good grades while coping with a parent in a military hospital can be even more challenging.

That's why the USO, along with its partner United Through Reading®, offers troops stationed at forward operating bases in the United States or overseas the opportunity to read a story aloud to their child. Mom or Dad's special story time is recorded on camera, and the USO mails this priceless DVD and book home.

"We have a two-year-old son, and this is the first time his dad has been away from us. At Christmas, he sent home a children's book and a DVD of him reading it through United Through Reading's Military Program at the USO. I can't tell you what a thrill it was for both of us. It really made our Christmas. My son watches it every night before he goes to bed," said an Army spouse.

For young children, the book and DVD not only encourage reading but it helps them remember what a parent looks like during a long deployment.

The USO recently celebrated its 250,000 United Through Reading's Military Program recording at a USO location.

Lions can make a difference in the lives of military children. Here are some ways your club can oet involved:

#### Organize a Book Drive

Host a book drive to support United Through Reading's Military Program. Books collected for this program must stay to the <u>list provided</u> which is a broad list of over 100 books. Only **new** books on that list are accepted for this program.

#### Organize a Virtual Book drive


Host an online book drive to provide personalized book and DVD packages to military children. Register your virtual book drive at http://www.teamuso.org/Lions Ask each club member to make a contribution online or have club members register and email friends and family asking them to support the program.

#### Adopt Your Local USO Center's Children's Reading Area

Help your local USO Center promote reading. Provide new books, coloring books and crayons for your local USO's children's reading library.

### **How Hadley and Lions Support Braille Literacy**

The Hadley School for the Blind supports the Lions Clubs International Reading Action Program with courses for individuals who want to be braille literate. These include Lions members and others who wish to learn how to read braille. Hadley is a distance education school offering tuition-free programs to thousands of students who are blind or visually impaired and their families, both nationally and internationally. The school also offers affordable continuing education courses to professionals, including Lions members.

Braille literacy courses for visually impaired learners are tuition-free and include:

- Braille Literacy 1: Tactile Readiness
- Braille Literacy 2: Learning the Alphabet
- Braille Literacy 3: Uncontracted Braille
- Braille Literacy 4: Contracted Braille
- Experience Braille Reading
- The Essentials of the Nemeth Code (mathematics)
- Using Raised Markers
- Braille Music Reading
- Braille Music Reading: Keyboard Music

Braille literacy courses for sighted individuals are mostly tuition-free and include:

- Introduction to Braille
- Contracted Braille
- Basic Nemeth Code
- Braille Teaching Methods for Adolescents and Adults
- Braille Teaching Methods for Children
- · Braille and Your Baby or Toddler
- Braille Music Basics

Lions Club members are encouraged to share the above information with others in their community, refer people to Hadley's braille courses and also enroll if they are interested in learning braille themselves. The Hadley School for the Blind also offers "just in time" training through free webinars on topics of interest to those with vision loss, their family members, professionals in the field and Lions members.
